While the pure joy of welcoming new life can fade as the responsibilities of parenthood begin, studies show that this joy often returns for parents and caregivers. The elderly man beside me called out, 'Help, help!' When I held his hand, he smiled right away.

Of course, even close partnerships can have disagreements and challenges. But joy is more than just happiness. It is the contentment that comes from knowing you have loved and been loved. This kind of joy endures, even after someone has passed away.

Joy... as the feeling of success.

Nothing brings me more joy than completing a task well, especially when it helps others. I sometimes think I have one of the best jobs in the world. When the bride and groom thank me for their special wedding day, when young parents thank me for a joyful christening, or when a widow thanks me for a memorable funeral—these are moments filled with joy when I know I have helped others and done a good job.

"Joy to the world" is the good news that the Angels brought to the shepherds in the fields at the moment of Jesus' birth.

This was also the joy that Jesus' parents felt when he was born. The name Jesus means Saviour, given in the hope and joy that Jesus would change the world for good through kindness and love, even to the point of giving his life. While Christmas is a time to celebrate his birth and the love he brings, it also invites us to look forward to the promise of resurrection and the ultimate renewal of all things. This hope of a kingdom where joy persists beyond the now deepens our celebration, transforming our seasonal warmth into an anticipation of everlasting joy.



### The WI Meeting in October was a talk from Steve Slade on his Flying Adventures

Steve was a keen sportsman, playing rugby, cycling, peddle car racing and in the Cadet Force at school. At 17 he won a Royal Naval Flying Scholarship and was accepted at the British Airways College of Air Training. A flying accident threatened to put paid to his flying career before it had even started, and after time in Stoke Mandeville Hospital's spinal injury unit he changed his career ambitions, studying Aeronautical Engineering at Southampton University. Steve's final year project involved developing a hand-control system for a light aircraft. In 1978 he moved to Bristol to work as a Development Engineer on the engine for Concorde, which was the beginning of a diverse career with Rolls Royce spanning 38 years.

Steve discovered that he could learn to fly with the charity Flying Scholarships for Disabled People. He built his own aircraft with adaptations which, as a paraplegic, enabled him to fly. He recounted numerous light aircraft and microlight 'Flying Adventures' over the last 22 years, taking part in Round Britain Rallies, Kiev to Odessa Microlight Rally, International competitions, (winning a gold medal at the 1997 1<sup>st</sup> World Air Games in Turkey) and the Guinness World Record (July 2002) for performing 102 successive take-offs and landings in his light aircraft in a 60 minute period at Kemble Airfield Gloucestershire. In 2008, after a significant amount of planning and organisation, to raise money for Help for Heroes a total of 114 airfields were visited, with only one being missed due to low lying mist obscuring the strip. This comfortably beat the previous record, which had stood at 70. As a child his daughter suffered with heart problems - so he raised money for the Children's Hospital by flying from Lands End to John O'Groats in a day - 750 miles and 11hrs 45 mins in the air. Nothing held Steve back! He has around 3,200 flying hours.

Steve illustrated these adventures with fascinating aerial views from around this country and beyond, including photographs taken in the local area showing the many changes in the landscape over the last 40 years.

Retiring from Rolls-Royce in December 2016, Steve now explores other hobbies in addition to aviation - brewing beer, sailing on Cotswold Water Park, Wheelchair Rugby with Bristol Bears and the Newport Dragons (they won The League!). He also goes on adventures with his electric buggy exploring footpaths and cyclepaths, and travelled the West Devon Way from Tavistock to Plymouth - a truly inspirational and impressive life well lived.

## **ACTION AT THE ARMSTRONG**

Work has continued non-stop on the renovation of the Cossham Hall and the creation of the new bar, kitchen and foyer. Significant milestones have been the completion of most of the internal walls, insulation of the foyer roof and installation of most of the cables and main pipes. The next stage, starting in November, was the installation of the new bar and kitchen and the final roof repairs to the Cossham Hall including the restoration of the vaulted ceiling.



All of this has been made possible by Maggie Lansdown's generous gift of £1.25m in memory of her mother. After much persuasion she has given her permission to call the main hall the 'Lansdown Hall' in recognition of her invaluable support, without which this project would have been impossible. Maggie has visited to see progress and meet the team, and was impressed by their enthusiasm and commitment to the project. The whole venue will be known as The Armstrong in honour of Frank Armstrong's generous legacy to the town over 50 years ago.

The focus for the Armstrong Team now is on raising awareness and support in the community, along with raising the vital £1.1m needed for the renovation of the larger hall. This will be needed for the provision of new flooring and roof insulation, as well as installing a greener and more efficient heating system. So several of the team have been out and about gathering support and giving out information and contact details. The Armstrong had a stall at Love Thornbury's Vintage Car Event and at the Christmas Lights Switch-On event. The response from the public has been very positive, and many thanks go to Thornbury Christmas Lights Association for donating the proceeds of the day to help with funds for The Armstrong project.

Phase 2 is vital for the future - we need to provide the large space to bring back community activities which have been lost due to closure, and provide a fitting arena for the talented drama and musical groups, including Thornbury Arts Festival, which have given the town such joyful delights over 50 years.

## **Alveston Gardens Association Meeting 6th October 2025**

The Xmas Lunch arrangements were uppermost on the agenda at this month's meeting. Topical tips were to sow broad beans, cut back asparagus, protect citrus fruit trees, turn compost heaps, and make shelters for hedgehogs. We then welcomed Vanessa Berridge from the Gloucestershire branch of the National Open Gardens Scheme to tell us about the how the organisation developed and some of the gardens we can visit.

In 1926 the honourable Elsie Wagg, who was on the committee for the Queen's Nursing Institute, suggested that to raise more funds those members who had attractive gardens should open them to the public and charge a shilling per person. She and several others did, and raised £8000. The King was impressed, and in 1927 agreed to open Sandringham's garden in support of the charity. More open gardens followed. In 1939 money was raised for the War Effort.

In 1948 the NHS took over running the District Nurses and the NGS began funding other nursing charities. In 1980 the Queen mother became the Royal Patron. In 1984 the first donation was made to MacMillan Nurses and in 1996 five new nursing and medical charities were added to the list of those supported. Some charities receive long-term support, some are supported to accomplish a specific project and others are just supported for a year. Dr Richard Claxton, the new chief executive, has a strong interest in horticulture as therapy and has been particularly involved with the development of Horatio's Garden which works with spinal injury patients.

A few facts and figures for 2025 about gardens involved in the scheme in Gloucestershire: 86 opened to the public, 75 provided teas, 60 had credit card readers, 48 were accessible to wheelchairs, 42 sold plants, and 32 accepted dogs (as well as assistance dogs). In 2024 the NGS raised £35 million overall, 80% of which was actually distributed to the charities.

The NGS has a website, and every year publishes a "yellow book" for each county. This lists which gardens will be open when and what facilities will be provided. If the garden you want to see is not open at a suitable time it may be possible to negotiate a private viewing for a group. It's always worth asking. Some gardens only open at a certain time of year because that is when they are really worth seeing. Vanessa then talked a little about some of Gloucestershire's gardens which take part in the scheme and showed some photos, particularly of the smaller less well-known ones, just to whet our appetites for next year. Start with the snowdrops ----- and go through to the Michaelmas daisies.

## Alveston Local History Society October 2025

This month's subject was, in some ways, very "local". Sir Handel Cossesham was born in Thornbury High St in 1824. His father was a builder and carpenter, and presumably lover of the music of George Handel. The young Handel went to work as a clerk in Yate colliery and seems to have really made his mark because at 24 he was able to marry Elizabeth Wethered, the daughter of a colliery owner. Soon afterwards Handel and his father-in-law opened up more collieries and Handel developed a reputation for being a very considerate employer, providing decent housing and medical care for his staff.

He was a member of Bristol City Council in the 1860s, and in 1885 became MP for Bristol East. He died after a sudden short illness in 1890, still concerned that there were no significant medical facilities for the poor of East Bristol - his will directed that the money he left was to be used to build a hospital as his lasting legacy. His idea was that the income from his investments would fund the running of the hospital.

The Cossesham Memorial Hospital was duly built in the early 1900s and opened in 1907. It was a "voluntary" hospital, paid for partly by Handel's legacy and partly by "subscribers" who would each pay an annual sum towards its upkeep. It was managed by an unpaid committee with "honorary" consultant surgeons and physicians. Unfortunately, there were not enough subscribers and the consultants received substantial "gifts" at the end of the first year which tipped the hospital's finances into the red from the start. The hospital had to close when a patient who was admitted with an unidentified fever was found to have smallpox. Quite a few patients caught it and some died. Clearly there were a significant number not inoculated.

The hospital reopened in 1910 and from then on theoretically each patient was supposed to pay £1/1/0d per week for treatment. This was more than most "ordinary" people could manage so the financial problems continued. The people of east Bristol valued their local hospital very highly and did a great deal of fund raising. The police proved to be particularly good at putting on events. Perhaps they had little crime to investigate!

The types of patients changed over the 1920s and 30s as motor vehicles became more common, and as WW2 broke out young male motor cyclists were a significant proportion of the intake. It remained open throughout WW2.

1948 saw the start of the National Health Service and the hospital has undergone many changes, particularly since the 1960s. The main original building is basically intact, but now only functions as an outpatient unit with dialysis, X-Ray, scanning and physiotherapy services. Handel would probably be disappointed that its usage is so limited. Even the midwife-led birth unit closed in 2023 for lack of trained midwives. What is next for Cossesham Hospital? At the moment even the future of the NHS seems uncertain, but Cossesham seems to be a survivor, so who knows?

## Hawkins Hide Allotments

### LEAFMOULD

It's hard to know what to talk about in the shortest months. Nothing's happening right now. I have parsnips, leeks and purple sprouting broccoli still growing. The soil is very soggy, as it always is in winter. Really not much to say.

Hmmm. OK, lets talk about leafmould instead.

Its not too late to gather leaves to start creating leafmould. All leaves will eventually form leafmould but waxy, thick leaves will take much longer to break down. I wouldn't bother collecting evergreen leaves from things like holly or laurel; focus on the leaves from deciduous tree/shrubs.



Place them in a bin liner or old compost bag, moisten if dry, make a few holes in the bag, tie the top loosely and leave for up to 2 years. Bingo, done. That simple.

You can use the well-rotted result as seed-sowing compost. It has been called black gold, and I suspect it is a waste not to use as seed compost (especially given the state of bought compost these days) but you can also use it as a mulch, a soil improver, lawn top-dressing, etc. etc. I'm filling all those empty compost bags that don't get thrown away because they might be useful - is that just me?

Pine needles will form an acidic leafmould. I did a PH test on my garden soil when I first moved here, and then my allotment when I first got it. If you wondered, the soil round here is very alkaline (the tester shows red for acid soils, green for alkaline soils; on both sites my tester showed it as dark dark green) so an acidic leafmould as a mulch is not a bad idea. If you get a real Christmas tree (shout out to 2nd Alveston Scouts) you could put it in a corner of the garden after Christmas to dry out and shed its needles. Gather up those needles and create a needle leafmould pile to rot down and use as a mulch round acid-loving plants. Although, to be quite honest, I'm not sure I'd even try and grow acid-loving plants around here, given how alkaline the soil, so use it anywhere. (Take the dried-out tree round the tip, on a groundsheets, it WILL shed needles in your car, please don't hold me responsible for the mess.)

## What's On: Thornbury & District Museum

A new exhibition is now open, which runs until Fri 19 December – **Thornbury: A Garrison Town in WW2**. Our district played an important, perhaps unexpected, role in the Second World War, as it hosted a significant military presence throughout the war years.



The exhibition looks at the various units which passed through the area, especially Thornbury's 'own regiment' – a little-known and unusual section of the Royal Artillery that was raised in the town and taken into the hearts of the residents.

What impact did the presence of hundreds of troops and the military aspects of the war have on the lives of the civilians? The exhibition features personal accounts remembering the armed forces, the fall of Dunkirk, aircraft crashes, the arrival of the 'Yanks', the build-up and effects of D-Day, and much more.

In our upstairs exhibition room, a **related exhibition**, "**My Dear Mum**", concerns the Harwich evacuees who stayed in Thornbury during the war. Their stories are told using personal letters, oral histories, photographs and other sources such as school logbooks. This should be of great interest to local schoolchildren learning about child evacuation.



We also now have another, smaller display in our Coins Room which looks at **Education in Thornbury**.

The magnificent **Thornbury Quilt**, which is part of the Museum's collection, is now **on permanent display in an upstairs room at Thornbury Town Hall** and can be viewed every Wednesday during the Town Hall's opening hours.



This unique coverlet was created locally in 1900 to help fundraise for a new vicarage. Some of its 236 squares represent local people and tradesmen. Their stories, and the story of how the quilt was rediscovered in 2013, are told in an accompanying audio-visual display, created by the museum.

The Museum is in Chapel Street and is open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays 1-4pm and on Saturdays 10am-4pm. Entry is FREE.
