As much as I enjoyed what I had, I couldn't help but wonder what it would be like if *Manta Force* had been mine.

MOTHER'S DAY, also known as **Mothering Sunday**, is celebrated on the middle (4th) Sunday of Lent, exactly three weeks before Easter Sunday. This year it is on March 15th. Lent is the period that starts on Ash Wednesday (the day after Shrove Tuesday, Pancake Day) and lasts to the day before Easter Sunday. This means that in the UK Mothering Sunday is observed on different dates each year, and sometimes even occurs in different months, normally in March or April, Lent dates being based on the cycles of the moon.


The exact origin of Mothering Sunday is unknown. Some historians relate the tradition to a Roman Spring Festival that was celebrated annually to honour Cybele, the Mother goddess (or Magna Mater) of the Romans. The traditions of this festival have some similarities with carnival and Easter as the themes of the celebrations were about death/mourning (trista) and joy/resurrection (hilaria). The spring festival was celebrated till the end of the Roman era. Christianity spread across Europe bringing new traditions to Britain. In the 17th century people visited their "Mother church" on this date - the nearest big church in the area or church where one was baptised.

Traditionally English children who had gone to work as apprentices and domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mothers and families. Often they were allowed by the cook or housekeeper to make a cake or take flowers from the mansion's garden for their mothers. Nowadays Mothering Sunday in Britain has taken on the name and character of Mother's Day as it is celebrated in most other countries in the world (second Sunday in May). There are family reunions to honour mothers and celebrate motherhood and traditional gifts of cake, flowers and hand made cards are still part of our Mother's Day traditions.

Daffodils are often given to mothers on Mothering Sunday. Other mothers who are no longer with us are still remembered with love. This photo was taken one March at the peaceful Memorial Woodlands nearby.

Alveston History Group - Christmas Traditions

At our last event before Christmas we received an entertaining talk by Clive Burlton, author, social historian and co-founder of Bristol Books, the not-for-profit local publisher (www.bristolbooks.org).

Adapting and updating John Penny's work, Clive's talk on the Traditions of Christmas started with the story behind the first Christmas card in 1843. Too busy to write letters during the festive season, a civil servant called Henry Cole, decided to send his friends a single-sided card on which only the names of the sender and the recipient needed to be written. Cole asked the artist John Horsley to come up with a suitable design and Cole printed 1000 copies of the 5"x 3" card. Those not needed for his own use were sold; thus giving birth to the world's first commercial Christmas card.

In 1957 Australia was the first country in the world to issue special Christmas postage stamps and we all recalled seeing – and some of us still owning – the special British stamps of the 1960s created following a children's competition on 'Blue Peter', the BBC TV programme.

Clive played the oldest known recording of the Edison Male Quartet, singing 'Sleigh Ride Party' in 1897 and Bing Crosby singing 'Silent Night' in 1942. We also heard the first Royal Christmas message delivered by King George V on Christmas Day in 1932. If you ever wondered why our monarch's Christmas message is always at 3pm, well, in 1932, the BBCs engineers considered that atmospheric conditions mid-afternoon would be ideal time for radio transmissions across Britain and the rest of the world. The 3pm tradition has stayed ever since and we were delighted to see the first televised Christmas message delivered by a very fresh-faced Queen Elizabeth II from Sandringham in 1957.

We went farther back in time as Clive traced the origins of the character of Father Christmas to the Middle Ages, which was also the time of excess, dominated by great feasts and general indulgence in drinking, dancing and singing. Father Christmas was often depicted surrounded by large amounts of food and drink and leading the revelry. Not much has changed has it!

We heard how the American publication, 'The Children's Friend', carried an illustrated poem called 'Old Santeclaus' which, for the first time, showed an old man on a reindeer sleigh bringing presents to children.

We saw a film clip of the Marshfield Mummers in action and we were encouraged to sing-along on a few occasions with the 'Holly & the Ivy', 'The Boars Head' and 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing', all sung with varying degrees of gusto!

A thoroughly enjoyable evening was rounded off with a Christmas Buffet of homemade savouries, mince pies, cakes and gingerbread men.

Alveston Gardens Association Meeting 3rd November 2025

This month was the combined AGM and monthly meeting. The AGM was smoothly dealt with, and we soon moved on to our speaker, Pam Forrest, who nobly stood in at extremely short notice when the booked speaker had to cry off because of illness. Pam showed slides of a visit to southern Italy and Sicily, an area many of us have visited, so they brought back memories for us.



We began with a picture of the amphitheatre at Taormina, then photos of a garden nearby created by Florence Trevelyan, an English woman who moved to Sicily in 1884 after falling in love with the place while on tour. The photos were taken in May when the *Erythrina caffra* trees were in full scarlet flower and the roses were making a magnificent display. There were also lots of yucca and cacti. Next stop was to view the citrus trees and date palms in a quarry near Syracuse Theatre. A magnificent church in Ragusa came next along with kapok and jacaranda trees.

Near Agricento is the Giardino di Villa Aurea, the garden of archaeologist Alexander Hardcastle who settled there in the 1920's. Today his garden contains cypress trees, figs, ancient olive trees, citrus trees, agaves, wild antirrhinums and leucanthemums. The ancient irrigation channels of Sicily, first made by Arab invaders around 800AD, are still in use. At Selinunte, a city that seems to have been abandoned in ancient times, there were lots of wildflowers. Pam had photos of kidney vetch, silene, tolpis and scolynus.

On the Amalfi coast on the mainland there were lots of lemon groves. Some of us remembered eating lunch sitting under lemon trees. They have been grown in the area since Roman times. A fresco in Pompeii shows a lemon tree. In Ravello there is a 13th century fortress with a very formal terrace garden containing lots of begonias and *Spiraea alpina* creating mats of pink flowers.

On Capri at Tiberius's House there were jacaranda trees, a Judas tree, strelitzia, wild cerinthe, euphorbia palustris, datura and bougainvillea. There was a herb bed at Capri market, and the abundance of wild flowers on the island had led to the production of artisan perfumes which permeate the air.

In the southeast of Italy there were orange groves and many, many olive trees. They are now threatened by *Xylella*, a fungal infection which blocks the water transportation within the trees. Matera, known for its' cave houses, had few plants. Lecce had lots of bottle-brush trees and Ostuni's residents favoured lots of plants in containers of all sorts. Pam ended with a few pictures of the round, conically-roofed "Trulli" houses in Alberobello, not noted for its' gardens.

Hawkins Hide Allotments - Pruning

Pruning is a huge topic and I can't cover it all in one small article. The RHS website has over 50 articles on pruning. The first piece of advice though is to check online for WHEN to prune a particular plant. Right now is a good time to prune blackcurrant and gooseberry bushes.

1. Remove dead/diseased/dying branches.
2. Remove crossing branches, remove the older or weaker branch. You're aiming to "open" the bush.
3. Remove branches as low as possible. You are thinning it rather than giving it a haircut.

Ok those are the first steps. At this point STOP and look at the bush. What shape are you aiming for?

You can grow gooseberries as fan-trained, cordons or open-centred bushes. For open-centred bushes you are aiming for a goblet shape. Take out any centre branches to get that shape. Keep stepping back and looking at what you have. Gooseberries fruit on both last years growth and older growth.

Blackcurrants are usually grown as mult-stemmed bushes. They fruit on young growth. Older growth has darker bark. Have you got younger branches growing to replace older ones? Plan ahead. Cut out the oldest stems close to the base.

Just keep stopping and looking at the overall shape of the bush. Stop, go away and come back to finish another day if you're not sure. Its not the end of the world if you prune too hard, that can re-invigorate a bush. My grandfather pruned my mother's blackcurrants right down one year, she was furious, but they did fruit better the following year.

A picture paints a thousand words, they say, so I've got some before and after photos of one of my blackcurrant bushes here. I'd also recommend looking at YouTube videos. Although, go for reputable sources rather than some ordinary joe who may or may not know what he's talking about - bit like me really, which is why I am trying to point you to reputable sources. :)

THORNBURY CARNIVAL COMMITTEE ANNOUNCES NO EVENT PLANNED FOR 2026

Speaking recently on behalf of the Committee, Liam Williams, Chair, said: “I’ve been involved with the Carnival since 2018 and have been Chair since 2019. It’s a community event that I’ve been proud to be a part of and in particular I’m proud to have led such an incredible group of volunteers that make Carnival happen. However, the last two or three years have demonstrated that there doesn’t appear to be an appetite for this kind of event any longer and certainly, not one that requires an entry fee to be paid.

“‘Love Thornbury’ have demonstrated that many aspects of the Carnival can be offered to the community for free through use of the revamped High Street – live music, market stalls, vintage car displays, children’s entertainment and fairground rides, great food and bars are now available most months on the High Street and we recognise this as an important development, not just for businesses, but also for the changing nature of our community.

“Following the two-year break for the Covid Pandemic, we took the opportunity to refresh the event and really hoped that this would offer the chance to secure the event’s sustainability. Regrettably, this has not proven to be the case, with attendance declining year on year, so the event is no longer affordable in its current form. Further to the significant loss made in 2024, we were fortunate to secure some critical financial support from Thornbury Town Council which meant we could run the event in 2025. We also received support from Friends of Thornbury Carnival who have stepped in several times over the years to support the event. On behalf of the Committee, I would like to offer our sincere thanks to Councillors, their Officers, and the Friends of Thornbury Carnival for their support over the years. Unfortunately, the challenges faced by South Gloucestershire Council meant that they have been unable to offer any support and this just added to the challenge of making an event such as ours work.

“Running the event in 2025 saw us work hard to reduce costs further and secure additional funding. We had the highest level of engagement with local businesses since the Carnival was first reinstated, and we are very grateful to them for their commitment. Regrettably, while the Carnival made a nominal surplus this year, it was highly dependent on Thornbury Town Council and a couple of key individuals who helped secure some sponsorship. Our long-term partnerships with Easter Compton Farm Shop and KJE Technical have also been essential to maintaining the event.

“The continued reductions in the level of attendance and the challenging financial outlook have caused the current committee to evaluate our role – we feel we have offered everything we can to run a successful event and we’ve taken time every year to evaluate what we are doing based on community feedback, experience and learning from other events. We have therefore collectively decided to step down from running the event and offer someone, or a group of people, the opportunity to come forward and consider how it might be brought back in the future. I am committed to sharing all of the information we have and giving anyone interested a full briefing in order that they can make informed judgements.

“I would like to finish by sharing my wholehearted gratitude to everyone who volunteered to make Thornbury Carnival happen in recent years. The dedication and commitment shown has been incredible and I only wish we had been able to achieve our shared ambition to create something for the community that was desired and supported to be sustainable.
